The Parochial Church Council presents its report and financial statements for the year ending 31 December 2019.

Aim and purposes

The Parochial Church Council of the Ecclesiastical Parish of St Mary the Virgin, Lapworth (PCC) has the responsibility of cooperating with the incumbent, the Revd P H Gerard, in promoting the ecclesiastical parish, the whole mission of the Church, pastoral, evangelistic, social and ecumenical. The PCC is also specifically responsible for the maintenance of the Church of Saint Mary the Virgin Lapworth (St Mary's).

Objectives and activities

The PCC is committed to enabling as many people as possible to worship at our church and to become part of our parish community at St Mary's. The PCC maintains an overview of worship throughout the parish and makes suggestions on how our services can involve the many groups that live within our parish. Our services and worship put faith into practice through prayer and scripture, music and sacrament.

When planning our activities for the year, we have considered the Charity Commission's guidance on public benefit and, in particular, the supplementary guidance on charities for the advancement of religion. In particular, we try to enable ordinary people to live out their faith as part of our parish community through:

- Worship and prayer; learning about the Gospel; and developing their knowledge and trust in Jesus.
- Provision of pastoral care for people living in the parish.
- Missionary and outreach work.

To facilitate this work, it is important that we maintain the fabric of the Church of St Mary's Lapworth.

Achievements and performance

In 2019 St Mary's has an electoral roll of 112 and an average Sunday attendance of 61 adults and 5 children.

Matters discussed at the PCC meetings included:

1 Outreach to Families - This is a continuing priority area for the PCC. The Rector is a Governor at Lapworth CofE Primary School, which is growing and currently has around 180 pupils. The Rector takes assemblies every week. There are special services at school for Harvest, Christmas and Ash Wednesday and school services in church at the end of each term. On 25th June Year 5 from the school walked to St Mary's Church to explore the church and Old School as part of the annual Pilgrimage Walk.

The church continues to offer a monthly "Family Service" and a twice monthly "Together@9.30" service aimed at families. In 2019 a "Baby and Toddler Praise" service was introduced on the third Tuesday of each month. The Junior Choir has continued to involve several children, despite the lack of a choirmaster since July.

In September 2019, following a Faculty application, pews were removed from the back of the north aisle to create a child friendly space around the font. A carpet has been put down along with child size furniture, books and soft toys. The PCC would like to thank Peter and Claire Hill who have led this project.

2 Occasional Offices (baptisms, weddings and funerals) – There were 13 infant baptisms in church in 2019, the highest number for several years. There were 5 weddings and 9 funerals in church in 2019, as well as other pastoral services, especially for interment of ashes. There was no programme for Confirmation in 2019.

Occasional offices create important links into the community, and it would be good to have more baptisms and weddings. The PCC has been working on an improved website, which should help with this. It is hoped that the new website will go live in 2020.

Achievements and performance (continued)

3 Special Services - The church maintains a regular pattern of special services, which provide opportunities to engage with the parish's wider community. These include Valentine's Day, Mothering Sunday, Easter, Ascension with additional choir music, Patronal Festival, Harvest, All-souls, Remembrance Sunday, Christingle and Christmas. Such services are often followed by refreshments or a parish lunch.

Choral Mattins on 29th September (St Michael's Day) was a special occasion because our diocesan bishop, the Rt Revd David Urquhart KCMG led the service. The Junior Choir sang Choral Mattins for the first time. The Bishop had come from St Michael's Baddesley Clinton where he led worship for the Patronal Festival. He stayed for the Parish Lunch.

On 4th December 2019 a short outdoor service was held in a layby on Spring Lane. This came exactly two months after a body was discovered in a burning car at that site. The service was attended by 12 people and four dogs. It was especially appreciated by dog walkers and as a meet your neighbour event.

- 4 Verger/Sexton In June 2019 Sue Hines retired after almost 14 years in the verger role. She and her husband Alvar moved to Tewskesbury, but still visit the parish occasionally. The PCC is grateful for the huge contribution they have both made over many years. In July 2019 six people were interviewed for the verger's post and Michele Twelftree was appointed as "Parish Clerk", which is the formal name for the role. Michele's first Sunday on duty was 1st December 2019, which included the annual Christingle Service.
- 5 Social Events The PCC is grateful to the Parish Lunch Team which hosted 7 Parish Lunches in 2019, including an extra lunch on 29th September when Bishop David attended. The PCC is also grateful to the now separate Events Committee who organise refreshments after key services and at parish events. Once again the Village Hall Committee organised a Harvest Supper, this time in the Village Hall on 28th September.
- 6 Christmas Fete This annual event was held on 23rd November at the Village Hall. It attracts many people who have little other relationship with the church. It also raised around £1,300 for the church. The PCC is grateful to Sally Parkes and her family who do the organising.
- 7 Parish Magazine After producing the July/August edition of the Parish Magazine, Bill Bailey handed over his Production Editor role to a new volunteer, Alison Burley. Alison started with the September edition and has continued to develop the magazine, which moved to colour printing throughout with the December 2019/January 2020 edition. The PCC is grateful to Alison for the new developments in the magazine, and for taking on the role of Production Editor. Financially the magazine has had a more stable year with a modest surplus, which looks sustainable. The PCC is grateful to Kit Nash who secures most of the magazine's income through advertising, and to Vera Male and Mike Whitmarsh who run the envelope donations in the February edition. Thanks to a dedicated team of distributors, the benefits of free parish wide circulation continue to be enjoyed by the church and by the wider community.
- 8 Organist On 14th July 2019 we said good-bye to our organist and choirmaster William Uglow, who has left us to take up a teaching post at Rugby School. William has made a huge contribution in his six years in the role, most significantly with the introduction of the Junior Choir. We are still looking for a successor to William. However we have quite successful in booking good organists to cover Friday practices and Sunday services. Also our former Organ Scholar, James Bate has played for a lot outside of the Oxford University Terms. We badly need a new organist and choirmaster to ensure consistency, planning and development with the church music.

Achievements and performance (continued)

- 9 Choir The choir, with juniors, sang a Family Service version of "Sermon in Song" on the fifth Sunday of Lent (7th April). On Ascension Day (10th May) the choir sang with some representations from Tanworth-in-Arden at the annual Ascension Day Cluster Service. The Carol Service on 22nd December was very well supported by both choir and congregation. It is important to recruit a new Organist and Choirmaster so that music for these occasions can be properly selected, practiced and performed.
- **10 Reader Training** Clare Kimpton completed Reader Training in Autumn 2018, and was licenced by Bishop David on 2nd March 2019. The Together@9.30 service, the 8.30am congregation and St Michael's have all benefitted from her ministry, which is much appreciated. Clare has also led some of the Compline services in Lent and introduced the new "Baby and Toddler Praise" service.
- **11** Lay Training Six Lapworth parishioners participated in the 2018/19 3D course (Diocesan Developing Disciples Course). It was the first Lapworth based 3D group to operate for several years. Four Lapworth participants successfully completed the course and received the Bishop's Certificate at the closing service on 11th July 2019. The diocese is planning to replace 3D with a more modular set of discipleship courses from September 2020.
- **12** Electoral Roll 2019 was a one-in-six year when the Electoral Roll has to be renewed from scratch. The publicity encouraged new people to join the Electoral Roll, so the number enrolled reached 112, hardly changed from the 2018 number of 113.
- 13 Charitable Support The church continues to support the Sparkhill Foodbank with donations of food collected at the back of church. Christian Aid is supported through a house to house collection and an annual supper and concert with Music Theatre Warwick. The PCC is grateful to the many people who help with these events. A group based in Lapworth Old School once again made Dresses for Africa and arranged for these to be distributed in Malawi. The PCC continues to make annual donations to several charities.
- 14 Diocesan Projects The PCC monitors the diocesan "People and Places" project with interest. So far the main impact on Lapworth has been a reduced Common Fund quota. It is clear however that the diocese must live with less stipendiary priests. This is already affecting many less well-to-do parishes, and will have a wider impact in the longer term. We are already feeling it in some ways because the Climate Emergency, widely recognised in 2019, meant that the Rector spent a greater proportion of his time on his Bishop's Adviser for the Environment role than in previous years. Also it is getting noticeably harder to find priests to cover services when the Rector is away.

As part of "People and Places" initiative the Diocese is merging the existing 13 Deaneries into six, each with a full time Area Dean. During 2019 there were various consultations about Shirley Deanery merging with Kings Norton and Mosley. A Bishop's pastoral order confirming the merger came into effect on 1st March 2020.

The PCC has four representatives in the Diocesan "Rural Learning Community", which has met a total of four times. Lapworth played host on 19th October 2019 when the group met at the Old School. That session was particularly helpful and has inspired a parish Mission Planning morning for Saturday 4th April 2020. The Rural Learning Community is closely linked to People and Places, but more specifically about rural parishes.

15 Churchyard – The new churchyard continues to benefit from the Dagger bequest and the old churchyard continues to benefit from Churchyard working parties twice a year and a November leaf rake. As evidenced under the EcoChurch heading, the PCC is increasingly interested in managing the churchyard in an ecologically friendly way to support wildlife habitats.

Achievements and performance (continued)

- 16 Church Path In 2019 we experienced growing difficulty and frustration with the church path. The path is particularly difficult for elderly people and people in wheelchairs. Much of the gravel has now been removed, and this has helped, but serious problems remain. The PCC applied for a faculty for a new hard surface path towards the end of the year. The Diocesan Advisory Committee (DAC) have asked us to get quotes for different types of path so that we are making an informed decision about the kind of path we want. Getting a new path surface is a priority for 2020.
- 17 Maintenance Projects No major maintenance projects were undertaken in 2019, but some important smaller projects were completed. The brushes on the church bell clappers were replaced in January 2019. The church's stained glass was professionally cleaned. The worst sections of the perimeter drain around the church were repointed to make sure that water drains away from the church building. The church path approaching the external door by the choir vestry was also repointed. This path must be monitored closely because it has the potential to become dangerously slippery. A new intruder alarm was installed at the end of May, together with a new alarm monitoring and maintenance contract. This appears to work much better than our previous contract. The new alarm system also covers the lead on the church roof in a way that is approved by our insurers Ecclesiastical. This means that the church roof is properly insured once again. In December 2019 several of the old light fittings which had failed were changed to warm LEDs. This has significantly improved the lighting in church.
- 18 Eco Church Churchwarden, Mike Parkes, has been encouraging the church take forward environmental projects and to seek Eco Church awards under the accreditation scheme run by A Rocha UK. Considerable progress has been made. Many new LED lights have been installed, a BeeBomb pack of wildflower seeds was sown in the churchyard, articles have appeared in the Parish Magazine and churchyard bird feeders have been installed. Regular services focused on the Environment have been taking place in the Season of Creation (1st Sept to 4th October) and the church has started to promote car sharing for journeys to church. It is hoped that the church can secure an Eco Church Bronze award in 2020.
- 19 Safeguarding A big step forward was made when Claire Hill agreed to take on the role of Parish Safeguarding Co-ordinator. The PCC is grateful to Claire. The parish is now compliant with CofE guidance requiring a lay person in this role. The change was implemented in January 2019 when the PCC approved Claire's appointment along with the necessary changes to the parish Safeguarding Policy. The PCC also approved a Statement on Domestic Abuse. In November, the Rector and Claire Hill had a session with Claire Wesley, from the Diocesan Safeguarding team, on the diocese's new Safeguarding Dashboard app. which produces a Safeguarding Plan for the Parish. Several people from the parish attended different Safeguarding training sessions, particularly the new course about responding well to Domestic Abuse.

Financial Review

Total receipts to unrestricted funds were £86,003 (2018: £88,650 *restated*) of which £30,836 (2018: £31,047) arose from Christian stewardship, £3,785 (2018 £2,791) was made from loose plate collections and £26,575 (2018: £28,670) was from donations and appeals. Total restricted income was £1,840 (2018: £26,030) of which £581 (2018: £13,020 *restated*) was from donations and appeals. Included within the total reported income was Gift Aid income of £9,319 (2018: £8,866).

Total income fell by nearly 20%. The PCC envisages that it will have to continue financing its activities through the existing sources of income; giving by the congregation, fees, donations from outside bodies and the income received from its financial reserves. The PCC is grateful for the ongoing support it receives from the Lapworth Charity.

Church running and maintenance costs were £22,536 (2018: £19,065). The contribution to the Diocesan parish share of £50,136 (2018: £56,107) largely provides the stipends and housing for the clergy. The sum that the churches in the Diocese have to find is shared between the churches to a formula, which for St. Mary's is approximately 60% of its unrestricted income of two years previous (that is, for 2020, 60% of 2018's unrestricted income). To ensure that the methodology does not compromise the PCC's duties as charity trustees, the PCC calculates an "Adjusted Unrestricted Income", which is its unrestricted income that has not been received to cover specific costs. It uses this to calculate a "Base Common Fund contribution". Using the Base Common Fund contribution, the PCC decides on the appropriate contribution to the Diocesan parish share it should make. For 2019 and 2020 the PCC decided to make its Diocesan parish share equal to its 2017 and 2018 Base Common Fund contributions respectively. Details of the PCC's calculations to derive Adjusted Unrestricted Income and Base Common Fund contribution are set out in the Additional Information section of these financial statements.

The net movement on unrestricted funds was an increase of £5,905 (2018: reduction of £1,875). The increase was entirely due to the gains on the investments.

During the year, the total fund balances increased from £244,999 to £247,012, of which £168,294 is unrestricted.

Through donations received from the congregation and giving at the PCC's discretion, donations totalling £5,862 (2018: £6,028) were made. Of this, three (2018: two) donations were over £1,000. These were to Christian Aid for £1,697 (2018: £1,722), The Children's Society for £1,290 (2018: £1,224) and Lapworth School £1215 (2018: £770). Christian Aid was supported through a house to house collection, for which the PCC thanks Peter Lapworth and all the collectors, and an annual supper and concert with Music Theatre Warwick. Most of the donation to The Children's Society was raised through members of the congregation having collection boxes throughout the year. The PCC is grateful to Bill and Kay Baily for organising both the Christian Aid supper and concert and The Children's Society collection boxes.

The principal financial management policies of the PCC continue to be the prompt banking of offertories and other income, the timely payment of invoices and regular monitoring of the cash flow position.

Reserves policy

The PCC tries to maintain a minimum balance on free reserves of greater than three months unrestricted payments. This is equivalent to a minimum of £21,833 (2018: £21,759). It is held to smooth out fluctuations in cash flow and to meet emergencies. The balance of the free reserves at the yearend was £122,217 (2018: £122,250), which is higher than the minimum balance.

Where the balance is sufficiently higher than the minimum balance, the PCC tries to further assist the Diocese by making its full Diocesan parish share contribution in January of the particular financial year. Full payment for the 2019 and 2020 financial years were made in the Januarys of the respective years.

Free reserves exclude restricted income funds, endowment funds and tangible fixed assets such as land, buildings and other assets held for the charity's use. Also, designated funds already committed for essential future spending (2019: £nil and 2018: £nil) are excluded from the free reserves.

The PCC is aware that its estimate of remaining quinquennial expenditure on the fabric is around £426,000. The PCC is therefore targeting having total unrestricted funds of around £448,000, less the restricted fabric fund. As at 31 December 2019, with the restricted fabric fund being £4,797, the target for the total unrestricted funds stood at around £443,000. The PCC is fully aware that its unrestricted funds of £168,294 are significantly below the target.

No minimum balance is set for any of the restricted funds, other than all the individual funds not being in deficit.

The PCC's main approach to managing risk, associated with holding reserves, is to spread the holding across a number of financial institutions, which at 31 December 2019 totalled six (2018: six).

Volunteers

We would like to thank all the volunteers who work so hard to make our church the lively and vibrant community it is. We want to mention our churchwardens Mr Roberts and Mr Parkes who have worked so tirelessly on our behalf. Thanks are also due to Mr Jackson and Mrs Baines who work hard as our Treasurer and PCC Secretary respectively.

Structure, governance and management

The Parochial Church Council is a corporate body established by the Church of England. The PCC operates under the Parochial Church Council Powers Measure The PCC and is a registered charity.

The method of appointment of PCC members is set out in the Church Representation Rules. At St Mary's the membership of the PCC consists of the incumbent (our rector), churchwardens, the reader and members elected by those members of the congregation who are on the electoral role of the church. All those who attend our services are encouraged to register on the Electoral Roll and stand for election to the PCC.

The PCC members are responsible for making decisions on all matters of general concern and importance to the parish including deciding on how the funds of the PCC are to be spent. New members receive initial training into the workings of the PCC.

The full PCC met six times during the year.

Structure, governance and management (continued)

Lapworth PCC has two related trusts, which are:

• Lapworth Old School Trust (Registered No. 1068925)

In March 1997 the PCC made a donation to S W Willson and A H Kimpton, promoters for a new trust to be formed and known as the Old School Trust. The conveyance of the Old School House was completed in March 1997 to the names of the Trustees of the Old School Trust. In March 1998 the full approval of the Charity Commissioners was given and the name Lapworth Old School Trust was entered in the central register of charities.

The charitable objects of this trust are for the benefit of St Mary's Church, Lapworth and the community without distinction of political, religious or other opinion including use for meetings, lectures and classes and for other forms of recreation and leisure time occupations with the object of improving the conditions of life for the said community. Members of the Lapworth Parochial Church Council who are also Trustees of the Old School Trust are Revd P H Gerard, Mr M E T Parkes, Mr H O Roberts, Mrs K Baines and Mr A I Jackson.

• The Willson Memorial Trust (Registered No. 1077750)

On the 31st December 1998 the PCC donated funds of £75,411 to the above Trust. The objects of the Trust are for the benefit of St. Mary's Church, Lapworth, Warwickshire and the community. Members of the Lapworth Parochial Church Council who are also Trustees of the Willson Memorial Trust are Revd P H Gerard, Mr M E T Parkes, Mr H O Roberts, Mrs K Baines and Mr A I Jackson.

On the 6th September 1999 the objects of the Trust were amended to read "The furtherance of the religious and other charitable purposes of the Church of England in the Parish of Lapworth". Since 2004 all income received by the Trust has been given to the PCC.

The PCC holds cash and investments, as custodian Trustee, on behalf of the Lapworth Old School Trust (LOST) and the Willson Memorial Trust (WMT). The procedures employed by the PCC to safeguard its own assets are extended to those funds belonging to the LOST and the WMT. Separate accounting records are maintained for each of these Trusts which may be used to indicate, when required, the amount of funds in the PCC's bank accounts which belong to the LOST and the WMT respectively. Details of the amounts held at the yearend for each of these funds are given in note 10 of the financial statements.

Administrative Information

Saint Mary The Virgin Lapworth (St. Mary's) is the Church of England church serving the local communities in and around the village of Lapworth, Warwickshire. It is part of the Diocese of Birmingham within the Church of England. The correspondence address is The Rectory, Church Lane, Lapworth, Solihull, B94 5NX. Registered charity number 1165322.

1 Accounting policies

The PCC is a public benefit entity within the meaning of FRS102. The financial statements have been prepared under the Charities Act 2011 and in accordance with the Church Accounting Regulations 2006 governing the individual accounts of PCCs, and with the Regulations' "true and fair view" provisions, together with FRS102 (2016) as the applicable accounting standards and the 2016 version of the Statement of Recommended Practice, Accounting and Reporting by Charities (SORP (FRS102)). The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention except for the valuation of investment assets, which are shown at fair value.

{a} Recognition of income and endowments

Income and endowments are recognised when the PCC becomes legally entitled to the use of the resources; and the inflow of economic benefit is probable; and the monetary value can be measured with sufficient reliability.

Grants and donations are included in the SOFA when any preconditions preventing their use by the PCC have been met. For collections and planned giving this is when the funds are received.

Gift aid and other tax claims are included in the SOFA at the same time as the cash donations to which they relate.

Investment income is included in the accounts when receivable.

Investment gains and losses include any gain or loss on the sale of investments and any gain or loss resulting from revaluing investments to market value at the end of the year.

{b} Recognition of expenditure and liabilities

Liabilities are recognised as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation and settlement is probable and quantifiable.

Governance costs include the costs of preparation and examination of the statutory accounts, the cost of PCC meetings and the cost of any legal advice to the PCC on governance or constitutional matters.

{c} Assets

In so far as consecrated and beneficed property of any kind is excluded from the statutory definition of "charity" by Section 10(2) (a) and (c) of the Charities Act 2011 such assets are not capitalised in the financial statements.

Investments quoted on a recognised stock exchange or whose value derives from then are valued at market value at the yearend.

Amounts owing to the PCC at 31 December are shown as debtors less provision for amounts that may prove un-collectable.

{d} Funds

Restricted funds are income funds that must be spent on restricted purposes and details of the funds held and restrictions provided are shown in the notes to the accounts.

Unrestricted funds represent the remaining income funds of the PCC that are available for spending on the general purposes of the PCC, including amounts designated by the PCC for fixed assets for its own use or for spending on a future project.

2 Change of accounting policy and prior period adjustments

On 1 January 2019 the charity changed its accounting policy in regard to processing funds on behalf of third parties. Previously, with the exception of LOST and WMT, processing of funds on behalf of third parties had been included in the charity's own reported income and expenditure. To give greater clarity as to the charity's financial activities, the processing of funds for all third parties is excluded from the charity's reported income and expenditure for the year ended 31 December 2019. Prior period adjustments, as shown in the table below, have been made to the relevant income and expenditure categories for the year ended 31 December 2018 in order to ensure a consistent accounting treatment across both 2018 and 2019. There is no effect on the previously reported net income before investment gains for the year ended 31 December 2018 as a consequence of these adjustments.

The restricted funds are held for the following purposes:

- The clock restoration fund was set up for the maintenance of the Parish Church's clock.
- The car fund is used to provide financial support to the Rector in paying for his mileage charges whilst on Parish business.
- The rectory decorating fund is for the cost of redecoration of the rectory.
- The Edith Mary Hudson fund arises from a bequest in 1937 and is for the purpose of keeping the Parish Church and Graveyard in good repair.
- The new churchyard fund is for the maintenance of the new churchyard.
- The junior choir funds are those which have been raised specifically for the ongoing finnacial support of the junior choir.
- The restricted fabric fund is used to separately administer funds raised for the sole purpose of the maintenance of the fabric of the church. The designated fabric fund is for funds which the Trustees have allocated for this purpose but for which no contractual obligation exists.

The Edith Mary Hudson fund's share of bank interest and dividends received of £30 (2018: £29) has been transferred to the general fund. This is in accordance with the terms of the fund and the practice of previous years. Sufficient resources are held in an appropriate form to enable each fund to be applied in accordance with any restrictions.
